

# The Chapels Royal of St Peter ad Vincula and St John the Evangelist HM Tower of London

Dear friends,



This coming Sunday, 23rd November, is celebrated in the Church's calendar as the Feast of Christ the King. The icon to the left shows Christos Pantocrator – Christ the Ruler of All. Whilst he is shown with a halo to indicate his divinity, Jesus is wearing relatively modest clothing and is in the act of blessing the world. The Feast of Christ the King was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925, to emphasise the sovereignty of Christ over all creation, in response to the rise of secularism and atheism in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. In 1970, its observance was moved from end of October to the last Sunday of Ordinary Time – that is to say, the last Sunday after Trinity - and thus to the end of the liturgical year. Together with the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, the Anglican Church often observes this Feast as part of the liturgical season of Kingdomtide, which runs between the Fourth

Sunday before Advent and the Feast of Christ the King. Whilst this is a celebration of Christ's sovereignty over creation, it must be remembered that our Lord's kingship was unlike that of most earthly kings, in that it was centred on self-sacrificial service not domination of others. Thus it is that at this Feast we celebrate not only Jesus's rule but also his giving of himself for our salvation.

In his Coronation Oath, His Majesty King Charles III made the following promise: "God of compassion and mercy, whose Son was sent not to be served but to serve, give grace that I may find in thy service perfect freedom and in that freedom knowledge of thy truth. Grant that I may be a blessing to all thy children, of every faith and belief, that together we may discover the ways of gentleness and be led into the paths of peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." That theme of service is a constant thread which runs through all that the King undertakes, and it is a theme echoed in the honours that he bestows on others. On 12th November at Windsor Castle, our own Canon Roger Hall was made a Lieutenant of the Royal Victorian Order and King Charles presented him with the insignia which go with that honour. I know that you will all join me in congratulating him on this richly deserved award.

**DIRECT DEBIT.** It is also possible to use the links above to set up a Direct Debit if that is what you prefer.
