Dear Friends,

Those of you who were in church on 15 May will have had the pleasure of listening to our guest preacher the Reverend Canon Faeq Haddad from Amman in Jordan. Some of us had met him when we were on pilgrimage there in March and we were fortunate that he was able to spare us time whilst he was in the UK to attend a high-level meeting in Cambridge of the Bible Society, called to address issues facing Christians in the Middle East. In his sermon, Canon Faeq reminded us that the Middle East is the cradle of Christianity and that Christians have been there since the time of our Lord's earthly ministry. Numbers of Christians in the region have dwindled significantly in recent years. You can hear former Archbishop Rowan Williams talking about this on the website of the organisation Embrace the Middle East. Canon Faeq was accompanied by his friend Huda Nassar, Director of the Middle East for the <u>Awareness Foundation</u>, an international humanitarian charity driven by Christian values which builds peace through education and training.

Poem by U A Fanthorpe – Not my Best Side

Ursula Askham Fanthorpe (1929 – 2009), who published as U A Fanthorpe, spent her earliest years in Kent. After attending St Anne's College, Oxford she became a teacher and ultimately Head of English at Cheltenham Ladies' College. She only began writing when she turned her back on her teaching career to become a receptionist at a psychiatric hospital where her observation of the 'strange specialness' of the patients provided the inspiration for her first book, *Side Effects*. Since that relatively late start, Fanthorpe was prolific, producing nine full-length collections, including the Forward Prize-nominated *Safe as Houses* and the Poetry Book Society Recommendation *Consequences*. She was appointed CBE in 2001 and awarded the Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry in 2003. Here, she offers a typically wry view of the depiction by Paolo Uccello (1397 – 1475) of St George rescuing the maiden from the dragon. After reading this poem, it's hard to look at the painting in the same way ever again.

Not my best side, I'm afraid. The artist didn't give me a chance to pose properly, and as you can see, poor chap, he had this obsession with triangles, so he left off two of my feet. I didn't comment at the time (what, after all, are two feet to a monster?) but afterwards I was sorry for the bad publicity. Why, I said to myself, should my conqueror be so ostentatiously beardless, and ride a horse with a deformed neck and square hoofs? Why should my victim be so unattractive as to be inedible, and why should she have me literally on a string? I don't mind dying ritually, since I always rise again, but I should have liked a little more blood to show they were taking me seriously.
