I hope that you and those dear to you have survived Storm Eunice and her relatives.

In case you may have missed it, I would like to draw your attention to a series of programmes on BBC Radio 4 at 1.30pm on Sundays, also available at any time on BBC Sounds. The series is called 'The Archbishop Interviews.' In each episode Archbishop Justin Welby speaks with someone who has made a significant contribution to public life about what they believe. He also talks honestly and openly about his own faith, so that it is more of a dialogue than a one-way interview. I listened to the first episode on Sunday 20 February, which featured the Turkish/British writer Elif Shafak and I found it a rich and moving experience. Future guests include the scientist Susan Blackmore and former Prime Minister Tony Blair, whose then spokesmen Alastair Campbell famously (notoriously?) said, in answer to a question about Blair's faith, "We don't do God." A topic which came up in the Elif Shafak programme is the tension between faith and doubt. The 19th Century Spanish writer Miguel de Unamuno said, "Faith which does not doubt is dead faith"; while the great Russian writer Fyodor Dostoyevski put it like this, "It is not as a child that I believe and confess Jesus Christ. My hosanna is born of a furnace of doubt." You may disagree with these thoughts, but I suspect that the theme will resurface in this radio series. Poem of the week: Tidal by R S Thomas

Ronald Stuart Thomas was born in Cardiff in 1913, the son of a sea captain. He was educated at University College of North Wales and later undertook theological training at St Michael's College in Cardiff. He was ordained as an Anglican priest in 1936.

During his time as a rector he began to write poetry and verse. His writing career continued for fifty years, during which time he produced twenty volumes of poetry, was awarded the Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry in 1964 and nominated for a Nobel Prize in 1995. Whilst religion was one of the major themes of his work, he also wrote about nature and about Welsh history. His most famous work is *A Peasant*, a poem that depicts a typical rural worker in the hills of Wales. Thomas enjoyed working in the countryside and spent his whole time as a clergyman working in rural parishes. He retired in 1978 and died at the age of 87 on 25 September 2000. His poem *Tidal* addresses issues of faith and doubt.

Tidal.

The waves run up the shore and fall back. I run up the approaches to God and fall back. The breakers return, reaching a little further, gnawing away at the main land. They have done this thousands of years, exposing little by little the rock under the soil's face. I must imitate them only in my return to the assault, not in their violence. Dashing my prayers at him will achieve little other than the exposure of the rock under the surface. My returns must be made on my knees. Let despair be known as my ebb-tide; but let prayer have its springs, too, brimming, disarming him; discovering somewhere among his fissures deposits of mercy where trust may take root and grow.

<u>Historic Royal Palaces – Superbloom update</u>


