We are now entering the Season of Remembrance. By the time you read this, we will have celebrated both All Saints' and All Souls' tide. The Tower has its own small Garden of Remembrance, with the names of friends and colleagues of the Yeoman Body recorded amongst the crosses on Tower Green.

On November 11th, as in most years, I shall be on board Havengore, the ceremonial vessel which transported the body of Sir Winston Churchill from Tower Pier to Westminster Abbey for his state funeral. There will be a series of services along the Thames, culminating in the final service on the river at 1100am outside the Houses of Parliament.

We shall have our own service of Remembrance on November 13th outside the chapel at 1050am. This proved very popular last year and the Governor has asked us to repeat it again this year.

Poem of the week

Keats wrote this lovely sonnet in about 1820, although nobody is quite certain of the exact date. He copied the poem to his friend and fellow traveller, Joseph Severn, as they travelled to Italy in 1820. The poem expresses Keats's deep love for Fanny Brawne, whom he met in 1818. Keats had left England for Italy in the vain hope that its benign climate might cure, or at least alleviate, his tuberculosis. Throughout his time there, he never forgot Fanny or stopped alluding to her in the poetry he wrote at that time. He died in Rome in 1821 and is buried in the Protestant Cemetery there.

Sonnet CCXLII

Bright star! Would I were stedfast as thou art – Not in lone splendour hung aloft the night And watching, with eternal lids apart, Like Nature's patient sleepless Eremite,

The moving waters at their priestlike task
Of pure ablution round earth's human shores,
Or gazing on the new soft -fallen mask
Of snow upon the mountains and the moors -


